

ROAD CLOSURES FOR CHILDREN'S PARADE DECEMBER 12, 2015

The parade begins at 9:00 a.m. Road closures are as follows: 500 Block of Ocean Ave will be closed between Pine St and Riverside Dr at Avenue A beginning at approximately 7:00 a.m. At 9:00 a.m., the entire stretch of Ocean Ave from the river to the ocean will be closed to all vehicle traffic except parade and emergency vehicles. Atlantic St (Hwy A1A) will be closed at First Ave, north to Ocean Ave. Traffic will be diverted west on First Ave. Two officers will be stationed at Ocean Ave and Oak St, intermittently stopping north and southbound traffic. Use Oak St as an alternative. Expect heavy vehicle and foot traffic from 9:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.

Sustainability is achieved when the needs of the present population are met without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs (Vanderbilt University). This season, let's try to reduce our consumption of resources and our generation of waste by following these tips:

Ten Tips for Minimizing the Environmental Impact of the Holidays

- 1. Save trees by sending electronic Holiday Cards or pick up the phone to wish someone Happy Holidays.
- 2. Reuse the front of greeting cards to make gift tags.
- 3. Be creative this year and consider giving the gift of time, sending an electronic magazine subscription, re-gifting, or baking a gift.
- 4. Wrap gifts in newspaper, recycled paper, old maps or fabric and tie with raffia which is recyclable.
- 5. Remember to bring your own bags or totes when shopping.
- 6. Consider buying a live tree with a root ball so you can plant it in your yard after the holidays, or decorate an indoor houseplant.
- 7. Invest in LED (light emitting diode) holiday lights which use 90% less energy than traditional incandescent lights.
- 8. Place lights on timers to save electricity.
- 9. Decorate with popcorn or cranberry strings.
- 10. Make wreaths and centerpieces using materials from your yard or around the home.

Holiday Safety Tips

The Holidays are approaching fast; all of us at the Melbourne Beach Police Department want you and your family to have a wonderful and safe Holiday. However, criminals do not take breaks from committing crimes. This year the Melbourne Beach Police is encouraging individuals that might have purchased a new flat screen TV, or other expensive items in boxes not to place them out to the curb for trash pickup. This gives the bad guy a good idea of who purchased what for Christmas. You may bring your empty boxes to the rear of Town Hall where we have a recycling bin for cardboard boxes.

Holiday Shopping

As the holiday shopping season is upon us, please take time to ensure you have a safe and happy holiday season. As you find time to shop, please be mindful of the following safety tips:

Be aware of your surroundings. Look for suspicious persons, etc. when you are in any area; Remember where you parked your car. While this may sound elementary, many shopping areas are spread out over large areas. Being unable to locate a car can cause you undue confusion and stress that may present you as a better target to a criminal; If shopping late in the day or after dark, park in an area that is well lighted. Keep in mind, if you are shopping at a mall, the time the store closes from which you enter the mall, as some stores close earlier than others. This may keep you from having to walk unnecessary distances to your car if you find the store has closed earlier than you expected; Shop in pairs at the very least. Take a friend or family member shopping with you. There is something to be said for safety in numbers; As you return to your car, make sure to keep your car key in your hand; Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Pay for purchases with checks, credit, charge or debit cards. Carry cash and wallets in a front pocket to reduce your chances of having your pocket picked; Don't leave car phones, purses, CD cases, or any other item of value in your parked car where they can be seen. Always conceal these items; Don't leave purchased merchandise in your parked car where it can be seen. Conceal these items also.

While these steps don't guarantee you will not become the victim of crime, they will hopefully reduce your chances of falling prey to a criminal. For more information, contact the Melbourne Beach Police Department at 321-723-4343.
